



SENIOR CHALLENGE CUP

The Birmingham Senior Cup was first contested in 1876-77, the same season as the Sheffield & Hallamshire Senior Cup, making these competitions the two oldest surviving county cup competitions in England. This evening's game is the 137th Birmingham Senior Cup Final, and the sixteenth to be staged at Villa Park, a record shared with The Hawthorns as these two venues have now staged the game more often than any other venue.

For good measure, the Aston Lower Grounds, part of which later became the site of Villa Park, also hosted the Senior Cup Final on 11 occasions, making 27 in all to be staged in Aston. (Confusingly, the early Finals at Villa Park were sometimes referred to as being played at the Lower Grounds!) The previous Finals to be staged in Aston are as follows, and include both the initial game and the replay in some years:

ASTON VILLA FC

Aston Villa Football Club, commonly referred to as Villa, were founded in 1874, and compete in the Premier League - the top tier of the English Football League system. The team have played at their home ground of Villa Park since 1897. Aston Villa is one of the oldest and most successful clubs in England, having won the Football League First Division seven times, the FA Cup seven times, the League Cup five times, and the European Cup and European Super Cup once. Aston Villa was a founding member of the Premier League in 1992, one of just three clubs to have been founding members of both the Football League and the Premier League.

During its history Villa has spent 110 seasons in the top-flight, the second highest of any club - Villa's first and only relegation from the Premier League was in the season 2015–16. The club returned to the Premier League in 2019.

Aston Villa in the Birmingham FA Senior Challenge Cup


Aston Villa were the dominant force in its earliest years, winning the Senior Cup 18 times in its first 36 years, and being beaten finalists on another five occasions between 1876 and 1912. Despite only have won the Birmingham Senior Cup once since then, in 1985, Villa are still well ahead of every other club with a total of 19 successes, and 28 previous appearances in the Final. Aston Villa are the only club to appear in the Final in six consecutive seasons (1879-85) and the only club to have won the Cup four years running, which they achieved twice, from 1887-91 and 1900-04. They are also the only club to have played in the competition's first season (1876-77) which still exists today.

There were long periods of time when Aston Villa claimed exemption from playing in the Senior Cup, which partly explains why Villa have not appeared in the Final of the Birmingham Senior Cup since 1996, when they were defeated by Birmingham City at St Andrew's, and have only won it once in the previous 111 years! For Aston Villa's last Birmingham Senior Cup success you have to go back to 29th April 1985 when they defeated Wednesfield Social of the West Midlands (Regional) League 3-1 at Villa Park, courtesy of goals by Dean Glover, Ray Walker and Dennis Mortimer.

RACING CLUB WARWICK

Racing Club Warwick Football Club is a football club based in Warwick, and competed in the United Counties League Premier Division South - however as of April 2024, The Racers won the playoffs and achieved promotion to Step 4.

They were formed in 1919 under the name of Saltisford Rovers and played in various local leagues including the Warwick League, Leamington & District League and the Warwickshire Combination until 1967. During this period the club won a number of honours, including the Birmingham Alliance Senior Cup when they defeated Birmingham City in the final at St. Andrews. In 1967, the club joined the West Midlands (Regional) League. Three years later they changed to their current name (which came from the fact that their ground is by Warwick Racecourse) and soon afterwards switched to the Midland Football Combination, where they were champions in 1988 and runners-up in 1989.

Racing Club Warwick in the Birmingham FA Senior Challenge Cup

It has been a remarkable achievement by Racing Club Warwick to reach the Final for the first time in the club's history, having never previously gone beyond the last 16, marking them out as one of the Birmingham Senior Cup's least successful clubs in this competition – until this evening! Warwick's lack of success in the Senior Cup over the years is very much down to their status as one of the lowest ranked clubs in the competition – indeed from 2009-19 they were reallocated to the Birmingham Midweek Floodlit Cup. Warwick are the first club from the 5th Step of the non-League pyramid to reach the Final since Alvechurch did so in 2010 but, so far, no club ranked so lowly has succeeded in winning it. Victory for Racing this evening would see a new name inscribed on the Cup for the first time since Solihull Moors in 2016.

Racing Club Warwick have had to work hard to reach this stage. Being one of six clubs required to participate in the 1st Round, they have had to win five games to reach the Final, the first time this has happened since Nuneaton Borough did so in 1992-93. True, they have benefitted by playing every game at home, but they have defeated Dudley Town, Solihull Moors, Birmingham City, Darlaston Town and Leamington to reach this stage, without the need for a penalty shoot-out.

There have been no previous meetings between the two clubs in the Birmingham Senior Cup, and Racing Club Warwick are the first United Counties League club to ever play in the Final.
