Our goals were clear, spread awareness of the impact of heart and circulatory diseases across Lincolnshire, share the work of the Lincolnshire FA, increase sign ups of defibrillators to our national database The Circuit, roll out our life-saving CPR tool RevivR and share amongst supporters of grass roots football, highlight case studies within the football community and raise £10,000 for life changing and lifesaving research at the British Heart Foundation

#### Raising awareness

Press releases, interviews blog posts, social media posts, Re Start A Heart Day CPR training and an appearance on ITV Calendar for the 50 for 50 campaign have all had a huge impact on spreading awareness of the partnership and heart and circulatory disease in our county.





#### Defib donation & registration

We set out to contact clubs with defibs to make sure that they are registered on the circuit. All new defibrillators donated by the FA in the grassroots community are registered with a guardian.

#### Powerful heart stories

We met Reggie, a football fanatic who is living with Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome, whose story was shared on Calendar news. We met Roley and Andy a cardiac arrest survival story, Trevor who shared his heart transplant journey and Ian who put his diabetes into remission by joining a walking football team.





#### **Fundraising**

Walking football festivals, the 50 for 50 campaign, raffles at events and heart month fundraising, it has all been happening over the last 24 months, from head office out to the grass roots pitches across the county people have engaged and donated.



## Reggie's story

Reggie was born with Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome and has endured three major surgeries on his heart in the first 6 years of his life. Reggie's condition meant he had to have open-heart surgery at just a few days old. Reggie is a true hero, a survivor but we need to fund more research for children like Reggie. Each day in the UK around 13 babies are diagnosed with a congenital heart condition.

HLHS is a complex condition, and some children will not survive all three stages of surgery. Although surgery can give a better quality of life, it is not possible to correct the heart abnormality, and it is uncertain how long children with this condition will live for. The longest survivors at present are in their late 20s. Heart transplantation may be an option for some patients, although this is rarely considered before adulthood.
