

We are extremely proud to have some of Frank's close family here with us again this evening, as Manchester FA will never forget his contribution. He remains in all our hearts and we would also like to thank all the participating clubs who understand the importance of the name in this competition.

May you continue to rest in peace and we know you'll be here in spirit.



THE FRANK HANNAH PREMIER CUP



The Premier Cup is Greater Manchester's senior non-league competition.

It was first competed during the 1934/35 season, the Frank Hannah Manchester Premier Cup (or Manchester County FA Shield as it was then known) was first won by Manchester North End.

CLUB HISTORY: ASHTON UNITED



Several teams played in the village of Hurst in the 1870s as the club began life as Hurst FC in 1878 with the first recorded game played in 1879 against Hurst Red Star. The current Hurst Cross ground was first used by the club in 1884, making it one of football's oldest surviving venues.

Hurst entered the FA Cup as early as 1883 and reached the second round at the first time of asking. In 1884 the club were one of 12 founder members of the Manchester FA and won the Manchester Cup in 1885 - beating Newton Heath, the forerunners of Manchester United; the attendance record was set at Hurst Cross the same year, with over 9,000 people watching the FA Cup holders Blackburn Rovers.

Following the war, Hurst returned to playing in 1918, setting a club record 13-1 victory over Marple the following year. The club switched from black and white stripes and the nickname 'The Lambs' to red shirts and being known as 'The Robins'. Hurst won two Manchester Challenge Cups in 1936 and 1939. Just before the outbreak of World War II, the club secured the services of William 'Dixie' Dean at the end of his glorious career – but the conflict was to deny the folk of Hurst more than a couple of glimpses of Dean's skills.

Like many others, Hurst struggled on and off the field in the immediate post-war era - the change of name to Ashton United came about in 1947. Ashton's first post-war trophy success again came in the form of the Manchester Challenge Cup, won in 1950, then held for three further seasons (1953-55). The 1960s started with Ashton as holders of the Manchester Intermediate Cup and later that year the club saw the debut of 15-year-old schoolboy Alan Ball, a World Cup winner just six years later.

Under the managership of Hugh Kelly, Ashton subsequently stormed to the 2nd Division title in 1962 – winning every home league game on the way - and taking the League Cup. 1963 saw the club win the Manchester Intermediate Cup once more, a feat repeated in 1966. After continually being frustrated in their attempts to re-join the Cheshire League, they embarked on a two-year experiment of playing in the Midland Counties League. Midlands football proved a financial disaster, and the club re-joined the Lancashire Combination in 1966; two seasons later they finally got their much sought-after move back to the Cheshire League, where they stayed until the North West Counties League was formed in 1982. The intervening years had seen the club twice win the Manchester Senior Cup, whilst their first season in the NWCL saw Ashton land the recently founded Manchester Premier Cup for the second time in three years.

CLUB HISTORY: ASHTON UNITED





Local businessman Terry Liversidge came to Hurst Cross in 1990 and helped transform the club and ground; in 1992, under manager Dave Denby, Ashton became the first team to win the NWCL title and cup double in a season where they lifted four trophies, including another Manchester Premier Cup. The club established itself as a force in the Northern Premier League 1st Division as they finished in third place six times over ten seasons, and won the First Division Cup in 1994, 1997 and 1999.

Ashton finally won promotion to the Premier Division via the inaugural NPL play-offs under Gerry Quinn in 2002, and also retained the Manchester Premier Cup they had won the previous season - they were to win it again in 2003 and became founding members of the Conference North in 2004, but their stay in the new league was ended after just one season.

A first ever NPL Challenge Cup victory was achieved when The Robins beat Northwich Victoria 1-0 in the 2011 final. After three successive end-of-season play-offs from 2014-16, in 2018 under a new manager in Jody Banim, it proved fourth time lucky as Ashton earned promotion to National League North. Ashton couldn't retain the higher status and relegation was confirmed in April 2019, just as the joint chairmanship of David & Jonathan Burke (son and grandson of Ashton's record appearance holder, Johnny Burke) had been confirmed as replacements for the outgoing Terry Hollis. Hyde United were beaten 1-0 in the 2021-22 Manchester Cup Final to give the co-chairmen their first silverware, who were also busy investing in updating the facilities at Hurst Cross. The club are looking to build on the existing community development programme and develop the playing side under current manager Steve Cunningham.

CLUB HISTORY: AVRO FC



Our history begins in the years just before the start of the Second World War. A.V. Roe established an aircraft factory at Chadderton. The factory would become the home of the famed 'Dambusters' aircraft – the Avro Lancaster, as well as the famous Cold War 'V' bomber - the Avro Vulcan. A.V Roe purchased a smaller factory in Failsworth, where the Lancaster Club was located.

In 1950, the Lodge was opened to all personnel of Avro and took on the Lancaster Club name. The Grade II listed Lancaster Club then became the club's headquarters for the next 67 years. We joined the Manchester League in the 1954/55 season, won the Division 1 Championship in 1988/89 and re-established our junior teams, but lasted just three seasons in the Premier Division before being relegated in 1991/92.

We again won Division 1 in 2003/04 and promotion to the Premier Division, but for a second time were relegated after three seasons in 2006/07. However, on this occasion we bounced back immediately, returning to the top flight in 2008/09 before being crowned Premier division champions for the first time in 2009/10.

By this time Oldham Council had bought the Lancaster Club land from Oldham Athletic FC who had purchased it as part of a plan to build a new stadium on the site, which never materialised. After numerous meetings between the council and our chairman Robert Fuller, we were granted a lease on the former Whitebank Stadium in Limehurst Village, Oldham. After an enormous amount of work to bring it up to standard, this has become our new home ground; The Vestacare Stadium.

In the summer of 2017, the new management team of Lee O'Brien and James Hampson took over and led the team to a second Manchester League Premier Division title, as well as the Manchester FA County Cup in their first season. The move to the new stadium has allowed the club to pursue its ambitions of Step 6 football which was achieved in 2018 with promotion. In our first season in NWCFL we reached the semi-final of the Macron Cup and the final of the First Division Cup, as well as reaching the 3rd Round Proper of the FA Vase. In the league we finished runners-up to Longridge Town and were promoted as one of the highest points per game clubs in the country.

Our first season in the NWCFL Premier Division 2019/20 saw us consolidate and finish a respectable 12th position after 30 games, the season being curtailed by the coronavirus outbreak of course. We also made a first appearance in the FA Cup, drawing to Litherland REMYCA.

CLUB HISTORY: AVRO FC





In the curtailed 2020/21 campaign, the team finished Boxing Day top of the Premier Division after some excellent performances, particularly away from home. The FA Cup ended in a defeat at home to Bootle after a performance that very nearly took the Merseysiders to penalties.

January 2022 saw the resignation of our successful management duo of Lee O'Brien and James Hampson with the club sitting in a highly respectable fifth position in the Premier Division. The board decided to appoint from within, and player Alex Frost became the new manager. The positive results continued in the league and we finished in a very creditable 6th position.

During the close season the new management team recruited excellently and the first contracts in the club's history were offered to a number of key players. We hit the ground running and recorded a club record 720 minutes without conceding a goal, with Emley in the FA Vase being the first team to score against us on 26th August, nine games into the season.

That consistency continued through the season and we suffered consecutive defeats on only two occasions, finishing the season with fewest goals conceded in the NWCFL Premier Division and in second position. That led to a play-off final at Lincoln United, an historic day for the club as goals from Tom Bentham and Jack Morrow fired us up into the Northern Premier League. Our first ever season of step 4 football has been a steep learning curve, but we have remained in playoff contention until the last month of the campaign and look forward to trying to better that achievement with a new management team in 2024-25.

PLAYER PROFILES: ASHTON UNITED





LUKE SIMPSON (Goalkeeper)

Luke began his professional career with Oldham and signed for Ashton in the summer of 2023 to fill the problem position of keeper.

SAM BAIRD (Defender)

Currently the club's longest serving player, Sam had an inspired 2022-23 campaign - the centre back monopolised the awards at the club's end-of-season Presentation Evening, winning every available award apart from Top Scorer.

LUKE BURKE (Defender)

Having played most of the last six years in National League North, it was no surprise that Luke immediately impressed in pre-season.

BERNARDO COUTO (Defender)

Portuguese-born started in England with Oldham's academy and made his Football League bow shortly after his 17th birthday; still only 19, he has already had a loan spell with The New Saints in 2023 and helped Ashton to a clean sheet on debut.

DAN COWAN (Defender)

Dan made his Robins debut on loan from Macclesfield Town in 2016; after promotion-winning spells with Stockport, Buxton and Macclesfield, he returned to Ashton as a permanent signing - linking up with manager Cunningham for a 3rd time in the process.

SEAN NEWTON (Defender)

Liverpool-born Sean joined Ashton as Player-Coach under Steve Cunningham at the start of 2023; he has Football League experience and an FA Trophy winners medal with York City on his CV.

PLAYER PROFILES: ASHTON UNITED



BRAD ABBOTT (Midfield)

A former Barnsley junior player and first teamer, Brad was brought in to patrol Ashton's midfield during the summer from league rivals Matlock, having helped the Gladiators to the play-offs despite him missing a large chunk of the season through injury.

ANDREAS BIANGA (Midfield)

Former Burnley trainee Andreas returned to Hurst Cross in the summer of 2023, having featured under previous manager Micheal Clegg before moving on to Mossley; he has also played for three other Tameside clubs - Curzon, Hyde, and Droylsden.

ALEX BYRNE (Midfield)

An attacking midfielder, Alex has played for a variety of current / former NPL clubs – most recently he was last season's top scorer and Supporters' Player of the Season at Matlock, before committing to Steve Cunningham's summer rebuilding programme.

JAMES CATON (Midfield)

James played in the Football League with Blackpool, Accrington & Shrewsbury – he then completed a BA Degree with UCFB whilst playing at National League level; a sound showing in pre-season led to the winger signing on at Hurst Cross.

NATHAN LOWE (Midfield)

A former Burnley trainee, Nathan was one of Steve Cunningham's immediate transfer targets on arrival in January 2023 – after a goal on debut he has gone on to become the heart of the Ashton midfield and one of the first names on the teamsheet.

GEORGE MILNER (Midfield)

Initially signed on a month-long loan to cover gaps at the start of the 2022-23 season, George returned to Ashton in October 2022 as a permanent recruit; a striker when with Chesterfield's academy, he can now be found playing in midfield or at full-back.

MARCUS CUSANI (Midfield)

A familiar face on the NPL scene, goalscoring winger Marcus ended his second spell at Atherton Collieries when switching to Hurst Cross in the summer – he has also featured with Warrington Town and Ashton Athletic.

JAMES HARDY (Midfield)

Stockport-born midfielder James had already played for Steve Cunningham at Buxton before joining Ashton on loan from Macclesfield – after scoring on debut, Hardy's loan spell was such a success that the two clubs eventually agreed a permanent deal.

CHRIS DAWSON (Midfield)

Former Leeds United and Wales Under-21 midfielder Chris links up with manager Steve Cunningham for a second time in his career, having previously played for him at Buxton.

MICAH JEBBISON (Forward)

Canadian-born Micah trialled with Sheffield United as a 16-year old alongside brother Daniel; prior to him joining Ashton in November 2023, the pacy striker had played a significant part in Long Eaton's back-to-back promotions over the past two seasons.

KIELEN ADAMS (Forward)

Initially brought in on loan last season, Kielen made such an impression in his first couple of outings for The Robins that he was soon made a permanent signing; finished as top scorer for the campaign with a final day 'screamer' at Bamber Bridge.

JAKE CHARLES (Forward)

The grandson of one Britain's greatest ever players marked his Ashton debut with a goal; Jake has gained a wealth of experience at National League and Northern Premier League clubs since making his Football league debut with Huddersfield Town.

JASON GILCHRIST (Forward)

Jason was prolific as a junior at Manchester City and in Burnley's academy; bagged a brace on his Robins' debut in January – one a clinical striker's finish and one a typical poacher's goal – and only finished one goal away from being leading scorer last term.

JAMES COATES (Goalkeeper)

Back up keeper, helping out on many occasions. A veteran experienced stopper who played for numerous clubs.

GRANT SHENTON (Goalkeeper)

A massive presence on and off the field, Shenton is the team captain having joined in the summer 2022. Grant was the NWCFL Premier Division goalkeeper of the season 2022/23, keeping a club record number of clean sheet

GEFFRY EBHOTE (Defender)

Born in Italy and played in Serie C for his local club in Verona before moving to the Northwest. Initially played amateur football for AFC Oldham before being picked up by Stockport Town in the NWCFL. Joined Avro in Summer 2022.

DAVID FITZPATRICK (Defender)

Highly experienced Manchester born defender who began at Northwich Victoria before playing Conference football for Southport, and also played EFL football at Macclesfield before joining Port Vale. Signed from Radcliffe this season.

LUCA HAVERN (Defender)

A vastly experienced defender who joined us after a period as interim Head Coach at Bradford Park Avenue, where he was a fixture in defence for over six years.

SAM RATHBONE (Defender)

Sam is the club captain and Avro through and through. Skipper of the Manchester League double winning side and NWCFL Division 1 North promotion team, Sam doesn't score many but when he does they are memorable!

DEANE SMALLEY (Defender)

A vastly experienced player with well over 100 appearances for Oldham Athletic in a distinguished career covering Rochdale, Oxford United and Bradford City.

CHIEKH THIAM (Defender)

Joined from Warrington Rylands, and counts FC United and Stockport Town amongst his previous clubs. Appeared in the EFL Trophy for Fleetwood Town. Born in Verbania, Italy.

KANE WALLWORK (Defender/Midfielder)

A hugely talented player who has been at Avro for all his career, and a survivor of our Manchester League side.

JAMES DWYER (Defender/Midfielder)

Came through at Chadderton, had spells with Prestwich Heys, Wythenshawe Town and Stalybridge Celtic, before making the move to the Vestacare Stadium.

BEBETO GOMES (Midfielder)

Hails from Guinea-Bissau, and is a tricky, skilful player who was at Pilkington before joining Stalybridge Celtic for a short time.

JAKE COTTRELL (Midfielder)

Another vastly experienced player with a pedigree from the NPL. Jake joined us after his contract at Ashton United expired, having spent most of his non-league career at FC United and Chorley FC.

MATTY CROTHERS (Midfielder)

Dead ball expert, Matty joined from Radcliffe in January 2023, where he had played for several years. His previous clubs were Curzon Ashton and Chadderton.

AARRON GREWAL (Midfielder)

A recent arrival from Witton Albion, Aarron is a skilful, pacy winger who began his career with West Didsbury & Chorlton.

ETHAN KERSHAW (Midfielder)

A non stop, all action midfielder who was a recent signing from Barnoldswick Town. Has caught the eye with his displays and has scored some important goals.

DARREN MCKNIGHT (Midfielder)

A calm and composed presence in the centre of the park, Darren joined on a dual registration arrangement with West Didsbury and Chorlton earlier this year.

JACK MORROW (Midfielder)

A box to box midfield dynamo joined in the summer of 2019, making his debut as a substitute against Squires Gate. Previously with Rochdale Sacred Heart.

JAMIE ROTHER (Midfielder)

A midfield dynamo and if there's a blade of grass he's not covered, we haven't found it yet! Jamie joined in December 2022, and is a hugely experienced former captain of Ramsbottom United.

MUIS BIBIRE BELLO (Forward)

Mallorca born, Middleton based forward who has come through the ranks from Avro's reserve side. Made his debut coming on as a sub in a win at Northwich Victoria last season.

LIAM ELLIS (Forward)

Heywood based striker who has played in NPL for Radcliffe, Mossley and Trafford. Began his non-league career at Avro, and rejoined permenantly in the summer of 2020.

KYLE HAWLEY (Forward)

A powerhouse striker with an eye for goal, Kyle joined us early in the season from New Mills.

BEN WHARTON (Forward)

An experienced striker who joined us from Bury FC. Stockport born Ben has vast experience at this level with several Northwest non league clubs, including making over 250 appearances for Radcliffe.

A coaches dedication takes players to the next level. Tactics, skills, fitness - all these things are important, but there's one big factor that can make a huge difference to the people you coach - and it could be the simplest change you make this year to transform your team.

Studies have even shown that players who feel positive on the pitch actually play better.

While as a coach you can't control each moment on the pitch, you can set the tone before and during every match, at every training session, in every interaction with your team.
