When a manager or coach in Youth Football receives a yellow card (also known as a Stage One Warning), they are reported at an internal meeting and a follow-up intervention is completed via the Club Welfare Officer. This effort to be proactive in educating coaches who make one mistake has been well received by clubs, with repeat offenders tracked and dealt with more severely.
