Not only do we have Referees, but there is the opportunity for specialist Assistant Referees. Upon progressing to Level 3 (Contributory League Referee) opportunities open up as a specialist Assistant Referee, mirroring the referee pathway all the way from being a Panel Assistant Referee, right up to a FIFA Assistant Referee.

As well as the 11v11 pathways, which are the most popular, Referees also have the opportunity to officiate in other forms of the game. Futsal, Small Sided Football, Mini Soccer, Disability Football and Walking Football all have their own pathways which allow Referees to service other formats of the game and progress to the higher levels should they have the ability, attitude and commitment.

Referees can be on multiple pathways, should they want to officiate in different formats of the game.

How many Referees are there in England?

In England each season there are c28,000 Referees who register with The Football Association, alongside c4000 people who start their refereeing journey by taking The FA Referees Course.

Qualifying as a Referee

The referee pathway starts you off as a Trainee Referee as you start your course with your local County FA. Upon completing The FA Referees Course and passing your practical refereeing assessment and Laws of the Game exam, you become a Level 7 Referee, unless you are 14 or 15 and become a Youth Referee.

Referee training, education and development

From the start of a Referees journey, The FA and County FA's provide training, education and development opportunities to all referees to support their development. This is a mixture of practical sessions on the field of play, indoor technical sessions that focus on clips, analysis and lifestyle, as well as distant learning through an online portal.

Grassroots Football

Every referee has the opportunity to apply for promotion to progress through the grassroots game. These promotions are decided by attendance at In-service training, laws of the game exams, observations from experienced referees on either three or five of your matches during that season and a set number of matches as an Assistant Referee.

The semi-professional game

Upon being promoted to Level 4, promotion is not optional and a merit table is produced using club and observer marks. This principal applies from Level 4 through to Level 2a. The National League System provides a superb learning environment for English Referees to progress through.

The professional game

Upon being promoted to Level 2a, a referee becomes a part of the <u>Professional Game Match Officials</u> (<u>PGMOL</u>) who are the managing body formed by The FA, the Premier League and EFL.

IFAB

The laws of the game that are applied to every game of football, from The FA Cup Final to a Sunday morning grassroots game, are set by the <u>International Football Association Board (IFAB)</u>.
